


Free things to try

Spotted on Facebook, this lady has produced a website to help with punch card design. [But you could use it to design any fair isle stitch pattern]. And, if you use an electronic machine, but struggle with making your own patterns, you could look this up first Inputting A Your own Pattern On the Brother KH965/965i Electronic Knitting Machine - YouTube which is a great video showing you how very simply. If it is the wrong machine for you, he has other videos which are also good, but I think the general principles apply anyway.


Pattern Punch Knit



It is still being developed but works fine - you need to experiment with it. I tried first with a 8 stitch pattern which would work on the LK150, using my new Needle Beetle [or selecting needles by hand] although I would not be using it for Fair Isle - This is the template marked Comma,



Which I then randomised to get this

I had not done any design yet, but still got some interesting patterns!


You can change the colours from the menu, you can choose other effects, or you


