Erica has many fantastic ideas to make with wire. I used her i-cord idea quite simply by twisting it and threading Pandora style beads on it – this took me minutes really, and, when I gave it to my sister-in-law, all her friends wanted one.

# Roly

a small DK hand spun neck warmer pattern idea of mine, named after my grandson's favourite character in Hey Duggie!



I started by knitting the left hand one by hand - with 5.5 mm dpn needles, about 80 stitches in a circle, and I knitted for about 5 inches. Loosely cast off, that was it finished.

The right hand one was knitted on the LK150, tension 7 and 70 stitches [I would do 80 next time]. I knitted 35 rows - the carriage jammed on this row, so I called it quits, and loosely cast off.



Both versions roll back on themselves naturally.

If anyone wants to knit it but hasn't got handspun DK, I would suggest Drops Delight as a good alternative, knit double on the LK150 or chunky, or single on a standard gauge.

I think this might also work well as a neck edge.

# Patchwork Wrap

I designed this cardigan in a slightly haphazard way, and, because of this, it is quite easy to alter!

I used my stock of hand spun DK, 300g of one variegated green shade of Merino [with lots of other colours], and odd bits of other colours.

I used 5mm needles for the body and 5.5mm needles for the sleeves.

My mitred squares measured 5 inches square [on the diagonal], so on this diagram 5inches tall and 5 inches wide.

If you need to match mine precisely, and find it difficult, you could experiment with needle size, or even stitch count. My finished wrap fits me well [size 14]. If you want to make a bigger or smaller one -rather than make lots of calculations, I would increase/decrease the needle size or stitch count.



#### Mitred Square

This is the basic shape in the body: you will knit many of these and join as you go. You can change colours where you want to, but it is better, I think to have a base colour for all the garter ridges and change the stocking stitch colour as you go. This means fewer joins and a more coordinated garment.

#### Basic square

Cast on [or pick up] 29 stitches in Main Colour [MC].

Row 1: MC K28, slip 1. [The last stitch is slipped on every row, which makes picking up stitches much easier]

Row 2: Alternate Colour [AC] Knit 13, slip 1, K2tog, psso, K12 slip last stitch.

Row 3: AC P26, slip 1

Row 4: MC K12, slip 1 K2tog psso, K11 slip last stitch

Row 5: MC K24, slip 1

Continue in this way, alternating colours, and decreasing on front of square, until 3 stitches remain. K3 together.

#### Side [half] square

Cast on [or pick up] 15 stitches in MC.


Knit as for basic square, except that the decreases will now be at the side of the piece. For a left sided half square, knit 1 decrease at the end of row 2, and following alternate rows. For a right sided half square, knit 1 decrease at the beginning of row 2 and following alternate rows.

#### Top half square

Pick up 29 stitches in MC. Knit as for basic square but decrease 1 stitch at either end of even rows as well as the centre decrease.

#### Knitting the body

The following diagram shows the order of knitting – the colours are only significant regarding knitting order! The body is shown on a slant because I could only do it this way. For a real life idea of it, look at the centre picture in my collage on the title page!



To knit the body [diagram on left] you will be knitting these squares in strips. You do not need to cast off in between squares.

#### Strip one

Knit one square. The first one should be the bottom most left hand [green] square on the diagram.

To knit the second square, pick up 15 stiches along the left side of your current square [including the stitch left over from knitting that one], then cast on a further 14 stitches, and knit your second square as above.

Keep going until you have a strip of 6 squares, then finish with a left side half square.

#### Strip two

As strip one, but after the first square, you will be picking up from the first strip instead of casting on.

#### Strips three and four

Knit in same way as strip two.

#### Strip Five

This time you will start with a right side half square, picking up stitches from the eighth square of the previous strip.

Continue with these strips as shown on the diagram.

You will have two slits for sleeve openings.

#### Sleeves

I used a larger needle size for the sleeves. It makes them a little looser, which suits my needs.

I picked up 69 stitches around the armhole slits – I did this on a circular needle, then changed to double pointed needles as I decreased.

I knitted stripes of 10 rows. I decreased 2 stitches at the armpit every 10 rows but increased this to every 5 rows after the 4<sup>th</sup> decrease. I think a decrease every 8 rows evenly would be better, but I was knitting on the hoof! I continued knitting until the sleeve seemed long enough – you can tell with this type of top-down knitting.

#### Finishing

I folded back the top row of mitred squares to make a 'collar' and stitched it inside the wrap, which I thought looked better than outside.

I crocheted round the remaining edge – 1 row double crochet, and three rows of treble crochet.

Then I steamed it, put a button on the front and finished!
