# Ribbing

I am not a fan of ribbing myself, preferring folded bands on the machine, and garter stitch when hand knitting, but I am probably in a minority. For those who like ribs, the ribber accessory is a boon, but one which many struggle with. For help **setting it up** [which I think is the main obstacle], these video links may help:

# **Projects**

I have been far less active with my projects since the return to social events. But I will try to sum up my activity [very little on the knitting machine, sadly].







These photos show my incomplete machine knitting project: I started this in May! Then had a vision relapse and have not had time or inclination to restart - it will happen one day, though. It is a circular knit cardigan, with a knitwoven skirt. I used lambswool for the body [plain blue] and a mixture of fine yarns for the weaving in the skirt - the picture on the right shows how I am including a fringe for the bottom. I will post pictures when it is finished!

When that is finished, and the machine is free!!!!, I am going to conduct a small experiment with my vast mountain of lambswool cones. I want to use them for felting, but do not want the felt to be very thick. I will try with various tensions and see what happens [watch this space]. I want to use the fabric in a jacket.



Since the first lockdown, I have been spinning large quantities of wool, mainly Merino, but also some rougher wool. I have lots of 100g balls of yarn, in different colours. I decided to hand knit a patchwork cardigan, using a rectangular pattern. The central picture shows the main body part. The top 'row' folds over as a collar. I knitted the sleeves, top down, and crocheted round the bottom and sides. The colours are truer in the pictures where I am not wearing it - I am not a great 'selfie'

photographer!
