April meeting

Plating

We will be demonstrating how to do this, which is a little dependent on the machine you have, but most machines will do it. It is great for using thinner yarns, making patterns with tuck and slip stitches, and for 'lining' garments which are made from yarns which irritate, for example.

The technique is quite simple, but there are a few things to remember.

- If you are using two yarns together, as in plating, the combined weight of them will determine the finished fabric, i.e. if you combine two 4-ply yarns it will be a little too much for a standard gauge machine!
- If you are using a Brother machine, I have found it useful to place an elastic band over the two screws holding the plating feeder, so as to contain both yarns in the feeder sometimes they have a propensity to jump out otherwise.

Knitweave

We will also be demonstrating how to 'knit weave'. I find this a great technique, especially as I am a loom weaver, and this is a kind of halfway house between that and knitting. It has more stretch than handwoven, although that stretch is in the 'warp' - that is vertical. The weaving yarn makes the fabric stable width wise.





If you want a good introduction to knit weaving, I recommend Iris Bishop's Kaleidoscope Project, which looks complicated, but is very skilfully explained,



and produces stunning results:

[My first meeting with Iris Bishop was at the Guild of Machine Knitters' AGM, where she gave a presentation of knit weave, amongst other things: she emphasized the importance of considering the yarn weights - memorably saying if you tried to combine two heavyish yarns, you would be weaving a carpet, not a garment! I just love her sense of humour.]


