

If you don't want to use a lace carriage, and you don't mind spending time with hand tooling, you can manually transfer and use charts to plan or follow.

If you want to do a small amount of lace knitting, this is certainly an option, and could be quite compelling.

My first introduction to knitting with my Brother lace carriage was to knit lace up to the armhole of a raglan waist length short sleeved cardigan. I did it in Yeoman Panama, which splits easily and was a bit frustrating at times. But the result was good, and so successful that I was asked by five different colleagues to repeat it for them. After I had done that, lace seemed quite easy.

Projects

Once again I have been working on hand knitting, largely because I am restyling my workshop and do not have space for machine knitting yet, but also because I am about to go to the KCG Convention, where I am leading a workshop on patchwork knitting. Pat is also going, and she is assisting on a machine knitting workshop.

I wrote before about spinning 25g skeins of yarn in varied colours. I used them in this patchwork cardigan, alongside a cone of King Cole 4 ply Superwash yarn in navy:




I am pleased with the result, and will put the pattern notes on the website, under patchwork knitting.

The really interesting thing about it, for me, was that I used an outline of the knitting pattern which I generated in Garment Designer, then knitted the patchwork pieces to fit - design as you go style.

An example of this is the back, shown below. The numbers on the diamond squares refer to the cast on stitches. If anyone is interested you can see more in

the actual pattern.



I may also generate the same design template in various sizes, which I will then put on the website in the same place.
