

This month we have a new 'Basic' pattern set on the <u>website</u>: a raglan jumper pattern for 4 ply yarn in a wide range of sizes, for babies and children through women to men.


I also used the pattern to make a beaded cardigan which I knitted on a Brother machine. I used the punchcard shown below, and, as the machine reads the punchcard, selected needles come forward into upper working position. I used this


feature to indicate where to put my beads.

I used size 6 glass seed beads, which are about 4mm in diameter, and mine had a hole just larger than the

1mm crochet hook I was using. Some of them did not quite fit, but most did. I used about 30g of beads, or about 500. For each piece of the cardigan, I

began the punch card pattern for the last 50 rows of the piece.





out all the white squares instead of the black ones, and then use slip stitch. Every time a stitch is slipped, you would then use that stitch as a marker to reform the stitch and slip a bead on. A little more effort, but not much.

#### Tips:

When placing the bead, put one on your crochet hook, then lift the needle slightly to expose the stitch, push the crochet hook into it, and lift it off the needle, before bringing the bead over the stitch and replacing it on the needle.

Take care when knitting the row after the beading. Beads have a tendency to go through the gate pegs and get stuck. Use weight or a pull on your knitting to avoid this, as well as putting all needles into holding position. Check after knitting that all stitches are free, and, if not, release the beads from the gate pegs. I brought the needles forward into holding position for the row after, too.

Make sure you use glass beads. Plastic ones will not survive pressing!
